A curvilinear house provides its inhabitants with something that a traditional house cannot, the innate ability to engage, embrace, and cross that line of house and human. The first thing that I altered in the design of my house was the entrance way. I went from a flat face that confronted visitors, towards a cave-like entry way, allowing the house to pull onlookers inward. This entry is a complex geometric form, which was created from stained glass and other recycled transparent materials, which spreads from the ground outside to the ceiling of the second level. This cave-like structure further emphasizes the theory of expansion and contraction which is seen throughout the building.
